Called To Evangelize

REFLECTION:

Why is it so difficult to be a disciple of Jesus? This Sunday's readings shed light on what it takes to be His follower. In the first reading, the drastic change in Peter's attitude toward the Sanhedrin becomes evident. Not too long ago before a servant-maid, he denied knowing Jesus three times for fear of being arrested like his Master. This time around, we see a totally different Peter, who fearlessly proclaims the divinity of Christ before the same men responsible for condemning and crucifying Jesus like a common criminal.



We are not unlike Peter who believes that Jesus is God and that our life here on earth is a passing journey towards heaven, which is our final destination. In order to attain eternal life, we obey the Lord's command to bring the Good News and proclaim the Kingdom of God to those who are in darkness. But what could set us apart from Peter is his total courage in defending his faith in Christ, regardless of the imminent risk and danger.

As followers of Jesus, we need to look into our hearts and see if we have the

same tenacity and obstinacy as Peter did. As we face contemporary moral issues such as birth control, same sex marriage, divorce and the like, do we have the courage to stand up to our faith and defend it?

There are countless martyrs who gave up their lives in defense of their faith and they too were ordinary men and women, no different from us. We are not being asked to die like the martyrs. What we are asked is to preach Jesus Christ by being living witnesses of His love and grace that we ourselves may have experienced.

Easter is a good time to renew our life and re-establish our purpose on earth and our reason for answering the call to evangelization. We are reminded to do what Peter was asked by the Lord, that is, "feed my lambs, tend my sheep, and feed my sheep" (cf. Jn 21:15-17). This is our theme for the week: We are faithful to Christ's word when we seek His will and follow His command. Like Peter, we are challenged by the Lord that if we truly love Him, we must care for His people. We should concretize our care for others by sincerely ad-

Tending the Flock

The Catholicity of Evangelization

Pope Paul VI, in his *Evangelii Nuntiandi* defined evangelization as "bringing the Good News into all the strata of humanity, and through its influence transforming humanity from within and making it new." That Popes after him have all laid out their thoughts on and call for evangelization in various forms, shows just how important this matter is for the Church. After all, Jesus himself commanded: "Go into the whole world and proclaim the gospel to every creature," (Mk 16:15).

In *Redemptoris Missio*, Pope John II described a new evangelization that focuses on fallen-away Catholics— those "baptized but have lost a living sense of faith or even no longer consider themselves members of the Church, and live a life far removed from Christ and his Gospel."

Pope Benedict XVI, recognizing once-Christian nations that are "now put to a hard test as a result of a constant spreading of an indifference to religion, of secularism and atheism," instituted the Pontifical Council for Promoting the New Evangelization.

For his part, Pope Francis, in his *Evangelii Gaudium*, added joy into the evangelization formula, stating: "an evangelizer must never look like someone who has just come back from a funeral!"

I tended to a young male patient who was pronounced dead on arrival at the hospital emergency room. This patient was about twenty years old and close to finishing a college engineering degree. He was playing basketball when he unexpectedly collapsed on the court. Young, healthy, smart, and then all of a sudden, dead. The doctor was in tears as he grappled to tell the distraught parents what happened to their son. The weeping parents could not believe it. They requested me to call their Catholic parish priest who, when he came, likewise struggled to give them answers. "Father, why did God take our son? He is all we have, Father. He is all we have! How can God be so cruel to us?" Shaking his head, the priest tearfully said, "I don't know," as he hugged them, making them aware that he, too, felt their pain. At those moments when we turn to our religious leaders for answers, they, too, could be seeking answers. This priest knew

that no amount of Bible verses or gentle, consoling words would make sense for the parents at that moment of anguish.

Reverend Welby mentioned Psalm 88 as his reference on his issues of doubt. I don't know enough of other faiths, but Christianity and Judaism allow their congregants some amount of tolerance to doubt. And yes, these examples and accounts of doubt are written in the Bible. You may find them in the books of Job, Habakkuk, Lamentations, and Psalms. I grew up in the Catholic faith, where the mere idea of doubting God is considered a sin. Sin that is so bad, we were afraid to confess it to the priest.

Reverend Justin Welby, in his utmost honesty, seems to have a candid personal relationship with God as he continues to question, to the point of challenging God whenever big tragedies happen. Surely, God can take our persistent, even ill-mannered kind of probing. If we listen closer, God might even clear some of those doubts and give us some definitive, conclusive answers. I must tell you the story of my good friends, Maryann and Albert (not their real names). For me, they are living an exemplary relationship with God. *(To be continued)*

The Good Shepherd

REFLECTION: The Gospel and the second reading from the book of Revelation promise us of the Good Shepherd who will lead us to life giving waters. Our Good Shepherd, our Lord and Savior sacrificed His life on the cross for the redemption of our sins. We all should be grateful that our heavenly Father has provided us the Good Shepherd to lead the flock to His glory. We should also be grateful for the opportunity to bring the lost sheep of the flock back into the fold. Let us not ignore this responsibility to all our brothers and sisters in Christ. Let us not squander this opportunity to bring home the lost sheep. We are all called by our Good Shepherd to bring our lost brothers and sisters back into His Holy Body, the Church.

Most of us have heard the Shepherd's voice. We have heard His gentle voice in the many moments of our lives growing in His grace and learning His Word. In the stillness during our baptism in the Spirit at LSS, in the quiet of Adoration and prayers, we hear the Shepherd's voice; we clearly hear His calls and instructions. But why do we drown out



His voice with all our worldly distractions and misguided priorities? How often do we ignore these calls, His calls to do His works and to follow His will, instead of following our own voice and will. Why do we do these things, why do we ignore His callings and instructions? Is it our pride, our selfishness, our arrogance? Probably, all of the above.

Sheep are fairly intelligent creatures contrary to what most of us think of them. They know and follow the shepherd's voice because they know he leads them to greener pastures and water to sustain the flock. They know that following the shepherd, will keep them all safe and well fed, very much like here at BLD. Young lambs initially do not hear or recognize the shepherd's

voice. Only through the flock do they learn to recognize and hear His voice. It is the sheep's responsibility to teach these lambs to hear and recognize the Shepherd's voice.

Most of us have been in this community for sometime now and can consider ourselves sheep. But why do we not act like sheep? Why do we not listen or follow our

FUN FACTS OF OUR FAITH

Devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary is considered intrinsic to Christian worship. In the Philippines, among the different forms of this devotion is a flower festival called the *Flores de Mayo*. The Spanish missionaries brought it to the country after the dogma of the Immaculate Conception was established in 1854. Held every afternoon during the month of May, it consists of basic instruction on Catholic doctrines, novena prayers and offering of flowers before the image of the Virgin Mary accompanied by the singing of children. The festival is capped off by the *Santacruzan*, a religious-historical pageant that depicts the finding of the Holy Cross of the Lord Jesus Christ by Queen Helena, the mother of Constantine, the Roman emperor who ended the persecution of Christians. Queen Helena had made a pilgrimage to Jerusalem in the year 326 to seek the Holy Cross which Constantine previously dreamed about.

The *Santacruzan* procession features beautiful women, called *Sagalas*, portraying biblical and historical characters. The *Reyna Elena* or *Emperatriz* is crowned and walks with a young boy as consort. They symbolize Queen Helena and Constantine.

Maryann and Albert are a married couple in their early forties. Maryann is a registered nurse and studying for her master's degree in nursing. Albert is an accountant. Both are very smart, very energetic, and very devout members of their Baptist church. About two years ago, Albert was diagnosed with ALS, or amyotrophic lateral sclerosis, better known as Lou Gehrig's disease (named after the New York Yankees' first baseman), a disease that afflicts 350,000 people a year worldwide. With ALS, "nerve cells in the brain and spinal cord that control movement stop functioning. The condition leads to paralysis, and patients cannot breathe or swallow on their own."

Maryann was my assigned nurse when I was at the hospital in 2014. She was a caring, pleasant nurse; she even prayed for my quick recovery. We spoke of our families, and there was no mention of Albert's illness, so I presumed Albert was not yet sick at that time. Last year, I saw them both at a rehab clinic, and Albert was now in a wheelchair. I tried to reach out for a handshake with Albert, and he only smiled. That's when I learned that Albert had ALS. Last Christmas,

we Filipinos in this area set up a fundraiser for Albert. I met Maryann again at a food store in May 2018. I expected her to be showing signs of stress from juggling hospital work, family life, grad school, and caring for her sick husband. It was at this chance meeting that I witnessed the genuine love they have for each other and the unyielding dedication they have for their God. She did not look tired, or worried, or burdened. She had an assured, radiating smile all through our conversation. "I draw strength and direction from God," she revealed to me. "We know that it is God's divine will that Albert got sick, and all of us in our family are now stronger and more faithful to God because of it." This is the statement that prompted me to write this essay. I know of other good friends who have questioned God due to some life tragedies, thinking that God has been unfair to them, and have eventually abandoned their faith.

Rabbi Harold S. Kushner wrote in his book . bad things happen. We find life's disasters upsetting not only because they are painful but because they are exceptional."22 He went on to say that most people wake up on most days feeling good, most illnesses are curable, most airplanes take off and land safely, and most of the time, when we send our children out to play, they come home safe. The accident, the robbery, the inoperable tumor are life shattering exceptions, but they are very rare exceptions.

Know Your Saints

Born in Madrid, Spain in 1070, Isidore was a farm worker in the employ of a wealthy landowner for the greater part of his life until his death in 1130. He married a very religious woman named Maria Torribia (also known as Maria de la Cabeza) who also became a saint. They had one son who died unexpectedly as a child. Their grief inclined them to believe their son's death to be a sign from God and consequently, they vowed to live a life of perfect continence.

Isidore frequented Holy Mass every morning but often reported to work late. Late, though he was, his plowing was nevertheless accomplished by angels that resulted in three times more productivity. His coworkers and his boss witnessed such miraculous events and accorded Isidore with great respect.

St. Isidore was canonized in 1622 along with four very notable Spanish saints. The group, known as "the five saints", included St. Ignatius of Loyola, St. Teresa of Avila, St. Francis Xavier, St. Phillip Neri, and St. Isidore. His body has been found incorrupt. His memorial is celebrated on May 15th on the Roman Calendar. In 1947, he was proclaimed the patron of the National Rural Conference in the United States.



Be More Like Jesus

REFLECTION: During the last supper, Jesus Christ said to his disciples: "*I give you a new commandment: love one another, as I have loved you, so you also should love one another,*" (Jn 13:34). To love others the way Jesus loves us is more challenging because it means giving of ourselves which, by our own human nature, goes against common sense, especially the sacrificial love that Jesus had given us. Self-giving which is selfishness in reverse is quite a tough act to follow.

However, love is more than just a simple warm feeling. It is an emotion that manifests itself in action. If you talk the talk you should also walk the walk, so to speak. As Matthew said, every idle word that men shall speak they shall give account in the day of judgment. Something we have to think about and follow sincerely. For Christ Jesus, love did not mean a sweet sentimental feeling; it meant action, putting your words into deeds.

But how can we love others the way Jesus loves us? We can do it in so many ways such as helping others when it's not



convenient, by giving when it hurts. The Catechism of the Catholic Church emphasized that "*charity is the theological virtue by which we love God above all things for His own sake, and our neighbors as ourselves for the love of God.*" Another way is by devoting energy for the welfare of others rather than our own. Paul and

Barnabas in spite of the dangers they faced travelling in hostile environment believed that they have the responsibility to encourage new believers no matter how dangerous, inconvenient or uncomfortable the task may seem. Did they do this for the

love of God? Of course! But they also did this for the love of God's children.

We too are called to practice love and share the gospel to the lost. We can't walk by on the other side of the road; we have to meet needs wherever and whenever we can. We are his disciples with difficult challenges. To know that we are true disciples of Christ we have to love others unconditionally but sometimes we lost the true meaning of how truly to be a disciple because of pride and selfish love. It is by

Peace Through Faith

REFLECTION: The peace of God encompasses everything that Christ has taught us, it's not just a peaceful thought or feeling. Therefore the Holy Spirit, the "Advocate", was sent to teach and remind us in times of crises when we forget what Christ has taught us. "Rejoice that I am going to the Father". How ironic is that, Christ has to leave us in order to be us.

The peace of God is not just the absence of war, pain or suffering but it comes from knowing and trusting God; that in the end God will prevail. The Peace of God begins within ourselves; we cannot share something we don't have. It has nothing to do with how we feel or the surrounding circumstances. That is why it's the "peace" that the world cannot give and cannot understand.

Following Christ does not mean we'll get rid of our problems, but it allows us to deal with our problems a little better. Our Gospel says do not let your hearts be troubled or afraid. The Bible mentions it 365 times one for each day of the year. The Bible is not simply saying do not fear but



rather to look past the fear and see the promise of God. It is okay to feel fear as long as we don't base our decisions out of fear. Jesus himself, fully human felt fear and sweat blood at the agony in the garden; but he chose love not fear. The Bible says love cast out all fear. So in our daily lives and in serving our community we base our decisions out of love and not out of fear.

Peace comes through faith in Jesus Christ and is also one of the fruits of the Holy Spirit. Like a tree it takes time to bear fruit, through several trials, triumphs and failures. Most Christians have no trouble relating "God the Father" and Jesus "God the Son". But have we established a personal relationship with the 3rd person of "The Trinity"? Something we are all guilty of. How can we have a personal relationship with a "bird"? Like a person he can give gifts as he chooses, like person we can sin against him. Our direction says to invoke the Holy Spirit in all our activities. He completes our relationship with the Triune God and puts our faith on fire and prevents us from becoming spiritually dry.

Purgatory

What happens to the souls of people who die in a state of grace but are not entirely free from venial sins, or have not fully paid the satisfaction due their transgressions? In *Spe Salvi*, his encyclical letter on Christian Hope, Pope Benedict XVI affirmed that God will purify them in what is called "Purgatory".



The concept of purgatory originates from the Jewish idea of an intermediate state between our death and resurrection. It involves purification and healing which mature the soul for communion with God. The Pontiff stated that "in order to be saved we personally have to pass through 'fire' so as to become fully open to receiving God and able to take our place at the table of the eternal marriage -feast."

The living can assist in this purification process through prayer (2 Macc 12:38-45). "The souls of the departed can "receive 'solace and refreshment' through the Eucharist, prayer, and almsgiving." The Pope recognized the basic Christian conviction that "love can reach into the afterlife, that reciprocal giving and receiving is possible, in which our affection for one another continues beyond the limits of death." Purgatory gives us the chance to love someone even beyond their grave.

As Pope Benedict XVI said, "it is never too late to touch the heart of another, nor is it ever in vain."

In the same book, Rabbi Kushner gave us a prayer written by a Jewish theologian. For me, this is the best prayer explanation of the unlimited, yet "limited," power of God.

"We cannot merely pray to You O God to end war, for You have made the world in a way that man must find his path to peace within himself and with his neighbor. We cannot merely pray to You O God to end starvation, for You have already given us the resources with which to feed the entire world, if we would only use them wisely. We

cannot merely pray to You O God to root out prejudice, for You have already given us the eyes with which to see the good in all men, if we would only use them rightly. We cannot merely pray to You O God to end despair, for You have already given us the power to clear slums and give hope, if we would only use our power justly. We cannot merely pray to You O God to end disease, for You have already given us great minds with which to search out cures and healing, if we would only use them constructively. Therefore we pray to You instead, O God, for strength, determination, and will-

power, to do, instead of just praying, to become, instead of merely to wish." Jack Riener, Likrat Shabbat

Rabbi Kushner has had his share of personal tragedies. His fourteen-year-old son, Aaron, died of the "rapid aging" disease called progeria. Despite their lives' painful personal heartbreaks, both Rabbi Kushner and Reverend Welby continue to reflectively preach and write about God's goodness. I hope that with this report, I have done that too.

FUN FACTS OF OUR FAITH

Medals and scapulars are some of the many sacramentals in the Catholic Church. A sacramental is anything set apart or blessed by the church to excite good thoughts and to help devotion. Through the prayers of the church offered for those who make use of these sacramentals, they convey and obtain God's grace and blessings.

Scapulars and medals bearing images of saints have been part of Catholic devotion since the early Church. Laypeople have used small scapulars, like the brown scapular—two small squares of brown cloth, one worn on the chest and the other on the back, joined by strings or ribbons, as a way to share in the monastic life. In 1910, Pope St. Pius X introduced a Scapular Medal to substitute for any of the various scapulars. This medal has an image of Our Most Holy Redeemer, Jesus Christ, showing His Sacred Heart, and the obverse that of the Most Blessed Virgin Mary.

It is said that the Scapular Medal is, in a sense, our "Catholic Dog Tag." The Brown Scapular, revealed to St. Simon Stock in 1251, was a way for us, upon our death, to be identified as a child of God. Our Lady of Mt. Carmel said, *"This will be the sign of the privilege that I have obtained for thee and for the children of Carmel; whoever dies clothed with this habit will be preserved from the eternal flames."*

Awaiting The Holy Spirit

REFLECTION: Have you experienced being beside a loved one who's dying, listening to them as they utter their last words? Some of us whose loved ones already passed away could only hope that we were beside them to hear them before they drew their last breath.

In today's readings, before Jesus was taken up to heaven, He relayed his last instructions to his disciples. He told his disciples to continue his earthly ministry to repent, forgive and preach in his name. We know that goodbyes are hard but Jesus' instructions for the disciples must be harder knowing that he would no longer be on their side.

But Jesus also told the disciples, "And behold I am sending the promise of my Father upon you; but stay in the city until you are clothed with power from on high."

The Ascension of the Lord tells us that as soon as Jesus ascended into heaven, and was seated at the right hand of the Father, the promise of the Holy Spirit became a reality for the disciples. The Holy Spirit became their source of Heavenly power for them to bear witness to him by their lives and to preach throughout the world.

With Jesus' promise and blessing, the



disciples became hopeful. Instead of being sad and discouraged, the disciples "returned to Jerusalem with great joy, and paid him homage and continually sang praises to him."

What does all of this mean for us today? This means that like the disciples, we as believers are called to praise Jesus for He did not really abandon us. He will be with

us always through the promise of the Holy Spirit of God, who comes to live and to work through us. And that's just a great reason for rejoicing!

We believe that God's call to repent, forgive and preach in His Name becomes easier when we have this hopeful and grateful attitude in the power of the Holy Spirit and therefore, we must always believe and await in the spirit in praising. God's call to repent is sometimes difficult especially for those who are struggling with their faith. Some of us might feel ashamed because we keep on sinning. We might go to confession but there's a frustration that we say the same things over and over again. As a result, we may also feel unworthy in accepting ministry work. Some might feel ashamed to go to our Friday Praise and Worship or to attend a



mass.


